Conditions Are Most Encouraging In Town Now

Industry Showing Signs of Activity at Present

Employment conditions are showing a big improvement in town during the past few weeks. The previous glass plate, which has been the back bone of the town for the past few years, is still going strong with some encouraging prospects for new growth activities in the near future. The coal mines at the Greenham Brick and Coal plant are also being active and will be well equipped to supply the full requirements of the town.

Two weeks ago the Federal Brick plant commenced operations after being closed a while, and this week the Good Hope brick plant opened up with a full staff of brick makers and shale miners. Average plants are now under way to commence making bricks at the Federal Brick Plant and it is expected that this plant will also be in operation in the very near future.

At the Pottery Plant conditions have greatly improved during the past few weeks. Owing to the increased demand for the ware, the plant is now working at full capacity. Taking his last from St. John's on April 11 as a leave for assuming his four years' ministry here Mr. Stewart gave a most impressive and lasting address, referring to the unfortunate world conditions during his sojourn here. Mr. Stewart praised the courageous manner in which the members of his congregation had faced these conditions as a result of which they had been permitted to come together regularly for prayer and worship.

Individual and collective, national and international, and the speaker, was at the root of the depression and unless we turn our thoughts and actions into harmony with the will of God and the teaching of Jesus Christ, the collapse of our present civilization is inevitable. He lived as a martyr in a world of sin, so long must we expect to suffer the consequences. If we brought from the depression as we should it will have been a blessing.

Mr. Stewart expressed a deep and ardent gratitude for the many kindnesses shown him and his family by the congregation during their stay here and for the help and encouragement they had been to him in his work. He expressed the hope that he had done them some portion of as much good as they had done him. His prayer for them would be that the Holy Spirit of God would be in their hearts and His name glorified in all their lives.

Mr. Stewart closed by giving his benediction from "Ephesians" "Yield not to evil or vengeance but go forward believing."
