Gas Contract Awarded

Calgary, Feb. 11.—One of the big gas contracts of its kind ever let in Canada, was awarded in two sections to W. F. Cochrane of Pittsburgh, and J. Brant of Indiana, Pa., Saturday, when they succeeded in digging the trench of the big main for the Canadian Western Natural Gas. Light and Power Company from Bow Island to Calgary. The extent of the ditching will be 170 miles, and the cost will be \$20,000. The total length of the transmission main between Bow Island and this city will be about 220 miles, but only a portion of its length will require to be ditched. The pipe line will be on the Canadian Pacific railway company's right-of-way. This work will give employment to a large number of laborers. It will be commenced just as soon as the frost is out of the ground.

Gas for Taber?

The Taber Times states that, an agreement, which if ratified by the Council in session, will mean the completion of the natural gas well at an early date, has been reached between the works and property committee of the council, and Mr. Wren, the expert from the Sullivan Machinery company, of Chicago. In several conferences during the past week, the members of the council and the expert have reached an understanding, and the contract which has been framed will be submitted to the council in session at the next regular meeting. The contract provides for the boring of the well to a depth of 2000 feet or until gas is struck. The company are to get \$1 per foot for the first 1000 feet and \$2 per foot for every additional 1000 feet.

No. 8 Tapped.

Reckoning from Monday, six million feet of natural gas can be added to the grand total that makes Bow Island famous as the world's greatest natural gas field. This further addition was secured at No. 8, a well that is situated north-west of the town. Drilling operations are now being proceeded with at wells Nos. 9 and 10.

Seed Grain.

In order to make use of seed grain not available in treated districts and to provide seed for the homesteaders at lowest cost, distribution will be done as follows wherever practicable: Every homesteader requiring good grain in seed, should apply to Mr. J. Bruce Walker, Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, for a list of seed grain of the kind the homesteader requires, or desirable quality to be purchased in his respective district, if one who has this grain for sale, can be supplied with a list of the orders he is to fill together with a lien form. The homesteader applying to the neighborhood will call on the man who owns the grain, present a duplicate order from Mr. Walker, sign the lien and get the grain. The order will then send the signed lien duly executed and witnessed, to Mr. Walker, who proposes he will receive his cheque for the amount covered by the lien. It will be readily seen that in order to avoid delay and disappointment, it is very important that the papers be absolutely correct in every detail. Farmers and grain dealers having seed grain for sale, and homesteaders who intend to apply for Government seed should write Mr. Walker at once in order that the work may be completed before seeding time. "Necropolis."

At the Presbyterian church Sunday evening an attentive audience listened to Mr. Sewell's sermon, "Necropolis," or death by neglect. Text: Hebrews 2:1. How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation. He said in part: Death, not life is the lot of the universe. Ours in 'The land of the dead, rather than 'of the living. Life, mysterious, elusive, is a mighty force upon its heading back through space and death reigns. The valley of life conflict is piled high with skeletons of defeated effort and lost opportunity. One epitaph answers for each "Died of Neglect." A neglected farm means a lifeless harvest of weeds, or a business specifies a client's away.

Neglected organs are lost, or numberless atrophy. Neglected families attainments, accomplishments slip away from a harking vessel. Even so a neglected salvation is a lost salvation. How shall we escape if we neglect so great salvation. Not an appeal to the un saved but a warning to Christians. He who hasn't a lion's heart is about my father's business. Satisfaction is business that needs working. Work your salvation. "How glorious our high calling" how great our salvation, so we shall be the thankful praise of God. A salvation as varied as the needs of the nation. It greases good tidings, binds up broken hearts, liberates captives, opens prison doors (Isa. 61). It feeds the hungry, clothes the destitute, waters the thirsty, entertains strangers, visits the sick, succours the prisoner (Mat. 25). Our Salvation is more than the brand of God for final identification, or through failure to believe with sleeping accommodations and stop-over privileges. We are workers together with God. We are the light of the world and man's only light that others may see. The light of the sun is powerless to warm or light empty space. It is dependent upon reflectors. So the sun of righteousness without us can do nothing, we are reflectors of his image. Neglect those lower lights and they expire under the burden of care, grow dusty and sooty by inattention, or burn out for lack of oil. However, get your light on the wick—be led to the unvary to death. Ye are the salt of the earth. If we neglect our saving grace, we are fit only to be trodden under foot. Ye are ambassadors for Christ. We are pleading with men to be generous to the poor. Ye are not sinners, ye are confessing Him before men. We are opposites of a selfishness. We are examples to the world: are we cheap shoody, or bargain counter goods, slightly damaged, and greatly reduced in price. Finally we are the Body of Christ. He who went about doing good is now dependent on our faith in his merits, our love to be below his teachings, our tongues to speak his word, our hearts to pulse his commissions. "I sent you out as workers into all the world. The great teacher says 'teach all nations.' The great Physician says 'heal the sick.' Such is his love in our stewardship. Neglected it means the condemnation. 'Depart, ye did it not,' performed it means your merit is to do the will of Him that sent me. For the world, it means salvation to the uttermost. For us it means to grow in grace.
